Description

The most prominent feature of this large, solid wood-sided home is its gambrel roof which one observes when on either side of the house. A belt course and generous eaves define the three levels. Front dormers add interest to the second story. The roof-line and the stable rectangular lines draw on the Dutch Colonial style of architecture

Description

Jacob Krokee was a laborer at the Cappon and Bertsch Tannery, so this style of house is fitting with his income around 1900. Krokee resided in this home until 1916. From 1924-1945 this was the home of Evert and Susanna De Weert. Mr. De Weert worked at the Ottawa Furniture Company. From 1947 to 1955 Herbert Jarogosky, a maintenance man at Donnelly Mirrors resided here. Sly Gibson, a laborer at Chris Craft, and his wife Nellie, lived in the home from 1956 to 1975.

The simple lines and lack of detail of this home reflects its probable origin as a humble house in the saltbox category. It was probably small with subsequent additions over the years. Modern architectural techniques are reflected in its aluminum siding and windows.

Description This large wood-sided house is attractive and interesting because of its many roof levels and various sized windows which add variety and yet work together to present a solid, balanced appearance. The variety of window sizes and roof levels may hint at a heritage in the Queen Anne tradition, although this home is lacking in detail and varying textures. Of interesting note are the rather elegant, though subtle, touches of a pedimented front door and the sculptured rafters on the front gable.

This home was built between 1894 and 1898 by George W. Browning, Secretary and Manager of the Ottawa Furniture Manufacturing Company. He and his wife lived here until his death around 1911, when she moved around the corner to 87 W. 14th Street. Another officer of the Ottawa Furniture Company, W.H. Wing, lived down the street at 88 W. 13th Street. After the Brownings moved, this was the home of Matthew & Mary Kolyn. Kolyn was a professor of historical theology at Western Theological

Bibliographic References Seminary. Since the early 1920's the home seems to have been changed to a two-family residence. Mrs. Kolyn lived there as a widow for several years.

Description

IN 1900 this home was owned by Winslow Quackerbush who worked at the bottling works. By 1913, a laborer at the Cappon-Bertsch tannery, John De Voy and his wife, Maggie, lived here. From 1921 until 1952, the home was owned by Charles H. Ketchum, an employee of the Holland Furnace Company, and his widow, Rose. Several families lived here from 1953 until the mid 1960's when the present owners, the Leon Wenzel, Jr., family moved in. Mr. Wenzel is a cook.

This small, square, woodframe home has been extensively modernized but the enclosed front porch and aluminum siding hide what appears to have been a Greek Revival house on a brick foundation. The low hip roof, square plan and central chimney all point to its original design.

Description

This large, imposing house, is gracefully placed on an upward slope of land. Many of its details drawn on the Queen Anne style of architecture -- various roof levels, shingled gables that add textural detail, an encircling veranda-style porch, and a tower. Most appealing and striking is the graceful porch which beautifully draws the eye across the width of the house. Closer inspection reveals matching pedimented hoods on either end of the porch. The circular tower however, is the eye-drawing spot in this home. Its dome-like roof and curved glass windows are of special interest.

This home was built by John C. Post, an early Holland lawyer and son of H.D. Post, an early civic leader. Post apparently committed suicide in the home in 1903.

During the Depression this large home was converted to student living quarters. Since then it has been used as a rooming house. The original floor plan has been greatly altered to accomodate these changes.

Description

The windowed front porch and simple gable roof lines of this home add to its attractive appearance. - A casement window in the front gable repeats the simple but nice lines of the house. A pediment over the door draws interest to the entrance. The very small, simple wood frame Queen Anne home has varying window sizes, a steep pitch roof and a bay window on its west side. The original porch appears to have given way for a later addition.

Description

This modest home, built around the turn of the century, was the home of Ralph Westfeld, a horseshoer, and his family. Early in the 1900's it was the home of Gottlieb Laepple and his family. Laepple worked at the Cappon and Bertsch Tannery. Since 1943, Mr. Abe Van Langen has lived in the home.

Description

The design tradition of this wood frame home is the Queen Anne style. The many roof lines, gables and dormers add interest. Other details of the Queen Anne style include a full length porch, shingled gables, a flared roof on a front dormer, and a cutaway window. The front gable is the center of interest with its vertical star pattern between two windows, and its carved brackets under the gable.

The home was built by George and Martha Kollen. Mr. Kollen was a partner in the law firm of Diekema, Kollen and Ten Cate. Mrs. Kollen was the sister of Kollen's partner, G. J. Diekema. She continued to live in the home (as a widow for many years) until 1952.

Interior features of the home include a lighted hearth piece in the entrance hall with the words "Oost, West, L'Huis Best." A Della Robbia fruit decorates the ceiling. This was painted by a Dutch painter. Fireplace tiles are from the Provinces of Groningen and Overijssel and there are Italian Marble pillars.

Description This wood frame home has characteristics of both Queen Anne and Colonial Revival styles and seems to have been built during the transitional period. The flared second story, shingles in the pedimented gables, and steep pitch roof are all from the earlier period, while the square plan and solid, unadorned lines foreshadow the later period. The lovely leaded glass windows in the front are especially worthy of note, and plain large oriel windows appear on the east and west sides. The original owners were James and Alice M. Purdy who were living at this address in 1913. Mr. Purdy had been a farmer living on East 8th Street in 1894. Upon retirement he moved to town and lived at 178 W. 12th before moving to this address by 1913. The Purdy's daughter, Carolyn, lived in the house until 1958 when she died of a fall near the post office.

Significance Miss Purdy had been a bookkeeper for the Holland Furniture Company.

This home of solid, simple lines, is interesting in its lack of detail. No frills in the basic structure are evident. Shutters add to a balanced look. The third floor gable line is accented by a narrow roof line which is repeated by the somewhat larger line of the porch roof. Of interest is the projecting front doorway with leaded glass detail as well as the leaded glass in a three part front window. (The house does not relate to any architectural style)

This home was probably built by George Mooi, owner of the Holland City Roofing and Cement Company. Mooi Roofing Company is still an active business in the Holland area. Around 1921, Harm Hilarides, a laborer at the Holland-Racing Shoe Company, moved here from nearby Washington Avenue. By 1929 he had changed his profession to painting. He died in 1940. The present owner is Mrs. Gertrude Hilarides (in her late 90's now).

Description

This 2½ story Queen Anne style home has a Waverly Stone foundation, and narrow beveled wood siding. Most of the sash windows have louvered shutters. There is a rectangular stained glass window on the side of the house. The verandah features Roman columns; above the verandah there is also a second floor balcony with columns. The roof of this home is hipped, with two shingled, pedimented gables. There is also a beltcourse on this rectangular home.

This home was built around the turn of the century by Wm. Wing, who was secretary and treasurer, and general manager of the Ottawa Furniture Company. From 1929 until around 1940 it was the home of the G. Marvin Brower family. Mr. Brower was owner of the Ottawa-Allegan Monument Company on E. 8th St. In 1940, this was the home of Edward D. Dimnent, a professor, and later President of Hope College from 1918 and 1931 (His sister, Mrs. Dykhuizen, and his nieces, Geraldine and Adelaide Dykhuizen, made their home with him.) He was instrumental in the building of the Hope Memorial Chapel, later named Dimnent Chapel. He died in 1959, but the Dykhuizens lived here for a few years after his death.

This two story, rectangular, Queen Anne style home, has a pitched, gabled roof. It is set on a rock-faced cement block foundation and has wide slate shingles. Most of the upper sash windows are bordered with small colored square panes. The front double door is wood paneled and glass. The open verandah is wood columned and has a pedimented gable.

This house was originally owned by John Koning (Cecelia, wife) who was an engineer for the Cappon and Bertsch Leather Company. In 1913 the house was owned by John F. Dryden, a clerk for the Pere Marquette railroad, and his wife Nellie, who we are assuming was a Koning before marriage (according to the 1894 census, and taking into account that in 1913 Koning lived with them as a retired person.) So the house was still in the same family. The Drydens lived in the home until around 1940. The home changed hands several

Description

In 1900 Wm. Garrod, manager of the Waverly Stone Company and his wife, Ruby, lived across the street in a modest home at 97 W. 13th. Shortly afterward, however, he apparently built this large Queen Anne home. Mr. Garrod became an insurance agent and worked in real estate after the Waverly Stone Company stopped quarrying foundation blocks in the early 1900's. Mrs. Garrod lived in this home until 1936 when it became the home of Martha Sherwood, who lived here until 1950.

Significance

This two and a half story Queen Anne style home has a Waverly stone foundation and narrow beveled wood siding. This home has many of the period characteristics, including an oriel, several leaded windows, a cutaway and two bay windows; some windows have an elongated hexagonal wood inset. The library has beveled leaded small panes. There is a large verandah, and a wrap around porch and decorative dentils. The hipped roof has two pedimented gables, some wood shingles and two gabled dormers. The wide eaves have a decorative bracketed cornice with dentils. There is a back porch and a sun porch on the second story of this rectangular home.

This smallish, 1½ story home has composite characteristics of the Greek Revival Style. It has a poured concrete foundation (possibly not original) and has been resided in aluminum siding. The pitched roof has a cross gable and a pedimented gable covers the enclosed front porch. There is also a side porch. Not grand or imposing in design, this home is in the "common" category and was most likely lived in by either small-scale farming, or laboring-class residents.

It is believed that this house was built by William Garrod, Manager of the Waverly Stone Company. His son, also William Garrod, was another owner of this house, most likely right after William Sr. The house changed hands many times. One of the owners was Anna C. Warnshuis who was widowed and lived here with her son, who suffered from "shell shock" possibly from the Civil War. The Warnshuises sold to Annette Bratt, but they reacquired the house. Other owners included Vern B. Carr, Lowell W. Stebbins, a bookkeeper at the C & B Tannery in the early 1890's; and most recently, Wynand and Alice Vandenberg, since 1958

Description

This 2½ story Queen Anne style home has a Waverly stone foundation and narrow beveled wood siding. Typical of this period, there are several window treatments including a round bay, and an elongated hexagonal wood inset window. There is a large Doric columned veranda with a wrap-around porch. The hipped roof has two pedimented gables with wood shingles and two triangular pedimented gabled dormers. There is a wood belt course and wide eaves on this rectangular home.

DESCRIPTION The two story clapboard Queen Anne is built on a cement block foundation. The varied roof of both gable and pyramid forms is typical of the style. The full one story enclosed porch with triple light over single light double hung sash windows appears to date from a later period. The interior of the house is highlighted with its original oak woodwork, an oak china cupboard in the dining room, and a beautiful oak staircase.





DESCRIPTION The one-and-one-half story gable front house is built on a concrete foundation and sheathed in modern synthetic siding. The enclosed gable front porch shelters the side entry. The addition of modern synthetic siding in 1981 compromises the architectural integrity of the house.


